This year has also been a year of deepened community collaboration for us; we continue to acknowledge that people experiencing homelessness, mental illness, addiction and/or poverty are best served by a network, rather than by any singular organization.

Knowing that we are unified with other organizations, businesses, government partners and compassionate neighbours to serve struggling individuals and families, is heartwarming. Thank you once again for coming alongside neighbours in need.

There have been a number of changes at MSL in 2023-2024. Among them, was a senior leadership realignment. Sue Fahner, former Director of Social Enterprise & Retail Operations, broadened her scope into the role of Director of Corporate Services. We also welcomed new Director of Finance, Shana Nyamandi, to the Senior Leadership Team.

We are delighted to announce that in this past fiscal year, the Mission Store achieved nearly \$1,080,000 in gross sales! This marks the Mission Store's first ever year of breaking one million dollars in gross sales, and represents an 11 percent increase from 2022-2023.

Reaching this milestone is a testament to the dedicated efforts of staff and volunteers, as well as to the faithful support of people like you – who continue to donate and shop at the Mission Store. As a social enterprise, the Mission Store operates not only as a thrift store (where inventory is sourced from donations of gently used clothing or household items), but also as a provider of programs. For instance, it offers the Emergency Voucher Program (EVP) to help folks obtain basic-needs items, including clothing, winterwear, linens, cookware, and more. In 2023-2024, the EVP issued more than \$148,000 in clothing and household items to participants – at no cost to them.

In regard to emergency shelter for men and families, demand remained high. We were full almost every night of the fiscal year. In addition, among other services inside and outside emergency shelters, Community Mental Health Programs regularly offered support in encampments. The team helps individuals obtain basic need items, assists in beginning a path to more stable housing, makes referrals to health care, and more.

As far as addiction treatment goes, Quintin Warner House (QWH) moved into an expanded, renovated space in June 2023. Men continue to heal as a result of completing the four-month, live-in program. In the words of Christopher, a recent graduate: "May 16, 2022, was the first day I stepped into QWH, and in that moment, I honestly felt my soul healing. I felt welcome. I knew I was in the right place." It is a privilege and a blessing to be able to walk alongside men like Christopher and to do that in partnership with you.

We at MSL remain open to God's guidance, and we thank Him for the opportunity to show care to men, women and children in need in the London area.

We express our deep gratitude to staff, volunteers, donors, funders, sponsors, and many other supporters. Your partnership enables continued services that reach neighbours at a crucial time.

"We would not have been able to survive the winter..."

Andres and Sofia are a young couple from Mexico. Upon their arrival in Canada in December 2023, they had no winter clothing and little money to survive.

They came to the Mission Store after hearing about the Emergency Voucher Program (EVP) from other students in their English as a Foreign Language class. Through the EVP, which provides basic-needs items at no cost to the participants, they were able to obtain warm winter clothing.

On their final visit, Andres was able to secure suitable clothing for a job interview he was attending that afternoon. He later informed us that they would not have been able to survive the winter without support from the EVP... and he got the job!

Spiritual Care Program Relaunch

It has been just over a year since I began my work with MSL as the Chaplain. Throughout the last year, I have been developing and adapting spiritual care programming with a trauma-informed lens, and according to the needs of participants, volunteers, and staff in an environment of choice (i.e., participation is strictly voluntary).

Raising awareness of MSL's enhanced spiritual care program begins with making everyone feel reassured. Meeting participants, volunteers, and staff where they are at is a priority—specifically with their belief, their understanding of faith, their comfort level discussing spirituality (or not), and their physical location in a multi-sited organization.

I want every participant, volunteer, and staff member to know that I am always there as a support through hard times, as a listening ear, and as a familiar face. I am also there as a bridge to faith communities and partners in London.

I thank all the donors who have contributed to the Chaplain's Challenge to date in order to support the spiritual care program's relaunch. I am grateful to be chosen as a co-labourer in this great work.

Quintin Warner House Expansion

One year has passed since MSL was blessed with the means to expand Quintin Warner House's (QWH) addiction treatment beds and relocate to 457 York Street.

The participants and alumni share their gratitude for the expansion because it allows us to open the doors to double the number of men who are seeking help to change their lives. It also enables us to provide additional spots in our Annexes, where graduates can stay for up to a year (after they complete the program) for additional transitional support.

With the expansion and relocation came a celebratory barbeque, the first event QWH had hosted since the pandemic. Because of the great turnout, we then hosted a Christmas party in December 2023. The Christmas party brought back alumni and their families, previous staff members, and supporters of QWH. Altogether, nearly 100 people attended.

We are enthusiastic about the impact of QWH's expansion, and look toward the future with optimism and excitement. Participants, alumni, and staff remain grateful to the Ontario Ministry of Health, and to the donors who made it possible for QWH to continue the steadfast support of men struggling to break free from addiction. *Thank you.*

New Partnerships

King's Community Support Centre:

KCSC KING'S | School of Social Work In 2023-2024, MSL partnered with King's Community Support King's Community Support Centre Centre (KCSC). The King's School of Social Work Field Education program created and delivers KCSC's services. KCSC provides social work support to London's most vulnerable people, including neighbours at risk of, or, experiencing homelessness.

Students from both the Bachelor of Social Work (BSW) and Master of Social Work (MSW) programs began visiting MSL's sites weekly to deliver one-on-one therapy sessions of all types to our participants, including various forms of counselling with a trauma-informed, strengths-based approach.

Cross-Cultural Learner Centre:

MSL signed a memorandum of understanding with London Cross-Cultural Learner Centre (CCLC) to work together to better meet the unique needs of asylum claimants who access emergency shelter and outreach services from MSL.

Under the new partnership, CCLC will offer services to MSL participants such as document translation, access to certified language interpreters, general immigration and settlementrelated sessions, and more.



MSL is excited to better meet need at the point of need through the formalization of the partnership with CCLC. We look optimistically at the future as we jointly serve newcomers in need of emergency shelter and settlement services.

Breaking Bread

In June 2023, Men's Mission reworked its strategy towards meal service for the first time since the COVID-19 pandemic. Men's Mission has returned to the sharing of tables during meal times.

Financials 2023-2024


MSL closes the year with a total revenue of \$10.7 million, reflecting an 11% decrease in total revenue realized in comparison to the previous fiscal year. Despite the challenging economic conditions, we are thankful to donors and funders for their unwavering support for MSL during the year.

Total Expenses

MSL ended the year with total expenses of \$11.9 million, slightly lower than the \$12 million incurred during the previous fiscal year. Total expenses incurred include program costs for additional bedding, amortization costs (no cash impact), depreciation costs for our property and equipment, as well as costs incurred due to repairing and maintaining our sites.
